
# The Enduring Importance of the Catholic Church Document "Nostra Aetate"

#### Beloved Sisters and Brothers,

"Nostra Aetate" ("In Our Time") is a landmark declaration from the Second Vatican Council. It fundamentally reshaped the Catholic Church's relationship with non-Christian religions, advocating for respect, dialogue, and understanding among people of different faiths.

#### **Promoting Inter-religious Dialogue**

One of the core contributions of "Nostra Aetate" is its strong endorsement of inter-religious dialogue. The document calls on Catholics to recognize the truth and holiness present in other religions and to engage with their followers in a spirit of respect.



A key section of Nostra Aetate is devoted to Muslims. The document recognizes that Muslims "adore the one God, living and subsisting in Himself; merciful and all-powerful, the Creator of heaven and earth." It acknowledges the reverence Muslims have for Jesus as a prophet, their veneration of Mary, and their commitment to prayer, almsgiving, and fasting.

The declaration calls for Catholics and Muslims to "forget the past" and strive for "mutual understanding" and "together preserve and promote social justice, moral welfare, as well as peace and freedom for all." This message remains especially pertinent in the country like Indonesia where Muslims are

the majority and Christians are minorities.

Nostra Aetate also inspires Catholic communities to participate in joint social projects, interfaith dialogues, and educational initiatives. By highlighting shared values such as compassion, justice, and the worship of one God, the document helps bridge divides and build trust.

#### **Challenges and Opportunities**

Despite its positive message, practical implementation of Nostra Aetate in Muslim-majority countries can face challenges. Minority Christian communities may encounter restrictions or





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misunderstandings. However, the document serves as a moral compass, urging Catholics not to respond with hostility, but with patience and dialogue.


On the other hand, Nostra Aetate opens opportunities for collaboration in areas like poverty alleviation, education, and peacebuilding. It also sets the stage for high-level interreligious meetings and grassroots cooperation, encouraging both Catholics and Muslims to work together for the common good.

#### Guidance for Peace building and Social Harmony


In the face of rising extremism, polarization, and violence, "Nostra Aetate" provides a blueprint for peacebuilding. Its

principles inspire faith communities to work together for justice, compassion, and the common good. By affirming the importance of listening, learning, and cooperating across religious boundaries, the document helps counteract the forces of division and conflict.

# MONTH OF DECEMBER: ST PETER CANISIUS – PATRON SAINT OF OUR PARISH



As we enter the months of December and January, our parish joyfully celebrates the feast of our patron saint, St. Peter Canisius, on 21 December. His life continues to inspire us with a powerful example of faith, learning, and tireless service to the Church.


St. Peter Canisius (1521–1597), known as the "Second Apostle of Germany" and declared a Doctor of the Church, dedicated his entire life to strengthening and defending the Catholic faith during the challenging years of the Reformation. Born in Nijmegen—then part of the Holy Roman Empire—he joined the Society of Jesus in 1543 after making the Spiritual Exercises under St. Peter Favre. He later played an important role in the Council of Trent, attending its sessions in both 1547 and 1562. Around this time, he adopted the Latin form of his name: Canisius.

Pope Benedict XVI once highlighted a striking line from St. Peter Canisius: "See, Peter sleeps, Judas is awake." Spoken in a time of great turmoil, these words were a call to awaken the faithful from spiritual complacency—a reminder that remains deeply relevant today.

In the spirit of Catholic renewal promoted by the Council of Trent, St. Peter Canisius worked tirelessly to revive the spiritual roots of the Church. He was known not only as a preacher and teacher, but also as one of the most influential writers of his time. He edited the works of several Church Fathers and authored devotional books and homilies that reached people across social classes.

Supported by Emperor Ferdinand I and Pope Gregory XIII, St. Peter Canisius promoted the Catholic faith not by condemning errors, but by presenting the beauty and truth of authentic doctrine. Even in his later years, he continued his mission by founding Sankt Michael College in Fribourg in 1580. He passed away there on 21 December 1597, and his tomb remains in the Church of St. Michael.

As we honour our patron this month, we invite all parishioners to join the Online Novena to St. Peter Canisius from 13–21 December 2025. May his life encourage us



to deepen our faith, pursue lifelong learning, and build unity within our parish community.

Through his intercession, may we face our present-day challenges with wisdom, courage, and steadfast devotion to Christ and His Church.

St. Peter Canisius, pray for us.

Reflection: - Jay, Trisula High Schol



# YOUTH RETREAT: MY TRUE IDENTITY

The Parish Youth Fellowship (YF) Retreat 2025, themed "My True Identity," was held from 5–7 December 2025 at the NOTO Training Centre, Sentul. A total of 41 youths participated in the retreat, supported by 16 dedicated volunteers who coordinated and served tirelessly to ensure the smooth and successful conduct of the programme.

In today's world, where social media strongly influences young minds, many youths struggle with identity—often trying to present what others expect to see rather than embracing who they truly are. This retreat was thoughtfully designed to help our young people pause, reflect, and reconnect with their authentic selves. Through a fun, nurturing, and faith-filled environment, the retreat inspired



participants to discover their true identity rooted in self-awareness, values, and faith in God. Over the three



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days, the youths reflected on the importance of knowing themselves, appreciating their uniqueness, and respecting the differences in others, while learning how these values help create a more understanding and compassionate community.

It was a truly enriching experience, filled with moments of prayer, reflection, learning, and fellowship. The retreat helped each participant gain deeper insight into themselves and strengthened their ability to build meaningful relationships as they continue their journey of faith.

Below are some of the reflections shared by our youth who participated this retreat:

#### Reflection #1 – Leyton, age 16 (ACS)

Before attending the retreat, I was quite uncertain about who I was going to be in the future. When I think of identity, I usually think of personality traits, habits, and behaviours that make a person unique. I signed up for the retreat because I thought that it would teach me how to refine my personality. The retreat

experience challenged me in ways I did not expect. It made me confront the deeper, internal parts of myself that I rarely stop to acknowledge.

A moment that stuck with me was the "Trump Card" session. At first, it seemed simple as the activity was to identify characteristics that define you. But I realized how hard it was for me to decide what made me the person I am, as I had always thought that all my attributes had equal value, and because of this, I struggled to choose. This surprised me mainly due to how it revealed how little time I had spent trying to understand myself. The first session made this even clearer as everyone's cards were starting to fill up, but I was falling



behind, taking up more time to think. It made me have a sense of worry, mainly due to how it felt like everyone had already decided on a path. That feeling stuck with me for a while.

The retreat gave me a mix of many emotions. I am grateful for learning more about identity, but at the



same time, frustrated at the weaknesses that I found. I felt a bit proud that I had started to reflect on these things, while I also felt disappointed with myself for not being able to answer. Despite these, this brought me clarity, as now I know that I needed to explore more. During the prayer to the Holy Spirit, I felt that I was being truly understood. It was as if God spoke directly to me, saying that it's ok and that I was forgiven for everything that I had done.

Additionally, during the retreat, I realized that I have been too hard on myself, especially after seeing how in the confession booklet it said that it was a sin to be too hard on oneself. It made me realize that God is ok with me making mistakes from time to time. With that realization, I've started being kinder to myself. I feel like my mental health will improve

after this retreat.

Unfortunately, this retreat didn't answer "who I am," and what my personality would probably be like, but it gave me the reassurance that identity is a something that changes, and it takes time to form.

#### Reflection #2 - Shine, Age: 18 (UOP)

Attending this year's Youth Retreat was a truly transformative experience for me. I arrived with many questions, worries, and emotions, but I left with a clearer mind, a peaceful heart, and a stronger faith. The sessions, worship, and moments of adoration helped me reconnect with God in a deeper way. One of the most meaningful parts was receiving a letter from my parents, it reminded me of their love and encouraged me to keep growing spiritually. I also surprised myself by making new friends, especially in my black-colour group, who were funny, supportive, and genuinely kind. Those three days taught me the value of community, openness, and trusting the Holy Spirit. I will carry these memories and lessons with me forever.



#### Reflection #3 – Clement, Age 18 (UNSW)

During this retreat, one of the most memorable activities was when we had to choose three situations that make us feel worthy. I chose having good grades, being the best at what I am passionate about, and having loyal and caring friends. At first, these felt like normal and reasonable sources of worth. But upon reflection, I realized that relying on these things to define my identity is not healthy.

When we base our values on achievements or other people, it can push us to do unhealthy behaviour. For example, wanting good grades could tempt someone to cheat, wanting to be the best could make someone

sabotage others, and valuing friendships too much could make someone overly controlling or possessive. Most importantly, all these things are fragile. They can disappear anytime. Just like in the story of the Prodigal Son; he had everything. But in an instant, he lost it all and found himself starving and alone.

From this retreat, I learned that our worth should not come from our achievements or people, but from God's unconditional love. His love does not depend on our success or behaviour, but rather it is unchanging and everlasting. No matter what season of life I am in, God loves me completely. And that alone should make me feel worthy.

Overall, this retreat made me learn so much about my identity: what it should be built on and what truly matters.







# MINISTRY OF HOSPITALITY (USHERS / GREETERS)



The Ministry of Hospitality of our Parish held its annual formation workshops on October 25 and November 8, 2025, gathering ushers and hospitality ministers for a time of reflection, renewal, and deeper formation in their liturgical service.

The program began with a presentation by Fr. Bambang Triatmoko, SJ, our parish priest, who spoke on the "Spirituality of Hospitality." He reflected on the biblical and theological foundations of welcoming others as an act of love and mercy rooted in the Gospel. Fr. Moko explained that the ministry of hospitality has its origin in Scripture, where serving is an essential part of Christian life. In Genesis 18:1–10a, Abraham demonstrated hospitality to the three visitors who appeared before his tent at Mamre, serving them wholeheartedly, recognizing them as messengers from God even though they were strangers. These verses express his willingness and humility in serving others. Fr. Moko emphasized that hospitality is not merely a polite gesture but a sacred vocation—a way to encounter Christ in every person. He invited the ministers to cultivate humility, empathy, and attentiveness, transforming their service into a genuine expression of God's love and presence.

In the second workshop, Mrs. Maria Fransisca Dinar Ari Wijayanti, Vice Chair of the Liturgical Commission of the Archdiocese of Jakarta, presented her formation material titled "Serving with Goodness, Grace, and a Heart of Mercy." Drawing from the Archdiocese's 2025 pastoral direction (Ardas KAJ), she highlighted the role of liturgical ministers as instruments of God's compassion, whose presence and demeanour should lead the faithful toward a deeper experience of the sacred.

The workshops explored in depth the essential need for a spirituality within the ministry. Spirituality is an attribute of the children of God, rooted in one's personal relationship with the Holy Trinity: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus Christ), and God the Holy Spirit. The Hospitality Ministry is a sacred service offered to God and to His people, and it is an integral part of the liturgical ministry—serving as both the first and often the last point of encounter when parishioners come to and leave the church. For parishioners, especially newcomers and those unfamiliar with the church, ushers are called to create an atmosphere of warmth, friendliness, and genuine welcome. Through their humility, attentiveness, and kindness, they help every person who enters the church feel at home in the community and open their hearts to the grace of the Holy Mass.

The workshop concluded with the renewal and installation of 22 members—both new and returning—from the Ministry of Hospitality. During the 3:30 p.m. Mass at St. Theresia Church, they publicly renewed their pledge of service before the congregation, committing themselves once again to serve joyfully, faithfully, and with hearts of mercy in their ministry.

Through this formation, the parish reaffirmed its

mission to make every liturgical celebration an encounter with Christ's love—beginning with a sincere welcome at the church's doors.

#### **PORTA SANCTA PILGRIMAGE BY ALTAR SERVERS**

#### Saturday, 15 November 2025

The Porta Sancta (Holy Door) is a special door found in major basilicas in Rome and designated cathedrals worldwide. It is opened only during a Jubilee Year by the Pope. In January 2025, Pope Francis opened the Jubilee Year and invited all Catholics to have a Porta Sancta pilgrimage. Thankfully for us in Indonesia, the Jubilee Year is manifested in such a festive way that across the churches in Indonesia, there are many Porta Sancta made for us to have our own pilgrimage. Jakarta is home to 69 churches with an officially designated Porta Sancta, giving pilgrims the option to choose from among the 9 deaneries. The theme of this Jubilee Year is Spes Non Confundit – Hope Never Disappoints. Passing through the Porta Sancta symbolizes entering God's mercy, conversion, and renewal.

The Altar Servers of our parish gathered together to pray and VISIT the variety of 7 beautiful and unique Churches across Jakarta on Saturday, 15 November 2025. It was a lovely experience for them especially as they were able to bond with one another. Altar servers started their pilgrimage of visiting 7 Churches from St. Theresia and concluded at the St. Andreas Kim Tae-Gon.

Below are some of the reflections shared by the altar servers who joined the pilgrimage:

#### Reflection #1 – Anna Rose Joby

Going on the STPCICP Porta Sancta trip was honestly such a nice experience. We spent the whole day going around Jakarta, visiting the Holy Doors at several churches. We started at Santa Theresia then travelled to Gereja Bunda Hati Kudus, Gereja Santa Maria de Fatima, Gereja Stella Maris, Gereja Santo Don Bosco, Gereja Keluarga Kudus, and finally Gereja Kim Tae Gon.


