MISSIONARY SPIRIT

Beloved Sisters and Brothers,

Introduction

Vatican II, in Ad Gentes (2) clearly states that "The pilgrim Church is missionary by her very nature." This statement highlights the truth that Christ is sent to save the whole world, not only to save person of a

particular race or nation. "For God sent the Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through Him." (John 3:17). Jesus invites His disciples to participate in this salvific plan of God and says: "Go into all the world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15) These words of Christ echo powerfully from time to time, through all corners of the world. The call of Jesus is not a suggestion or advice: it is a divine command, an urgent, and universal call.

In the history of the Church, however, this call takes sometimes to become awareness of the people of God. For the Church, this mission is not a secondary activity of the Church. It is her very reason for being and existence. St. Paul reminds us: "Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel!" (1 Cor 9:16). This pastoral message presents the missionary soul of the Church, and to invite us to live it out, here and now.



Basic understanding

The word "missionary" comes from the Latin word "*missio*", meaning "sending." In the Catholic tradition, it refers the will of Christ to send the Church—and of every Christian—to announce the Gospel wherever they may be. The source of this mission is from the heart of the Trinity, namely, that God the Father sends the Son, the Son and the Father sent the Holy Spirit, and the Spirit sends the Church.

From this perspective, the mission of the Church has her theological foundation. Mission is participation in




God's salvific mission of Jesus Christ. Mission of the Church is not merely a human endeavour, but it is cooperation with the work of God. The true missionary is not primarily about a person who is "doing things", but about *being someone*: a witness of Christ in daily life. Carrying the mission of Christ is by being light, salt, leaven for others (cf. Mt 5:13–14). Every Christian must live as person with integrity: preaching is not only talking with our lips, but with our life. This kind of lifestyle certainly requires love, prayer, humility, ongoing conversion, and deep union of love with God and others.



The Growth of the Missionary Spirit in the history of the Church

Although during the life of Jesus, the disciples had been ever sent by Jesus to preach the Good News, yet after Pentecost, the disciples were scattered across the known world. It was painful and miserable situation, but God continuously strengthened them to stay faithful to the mission from Christ. To preach the Gospel not only by words but even with risking their own life. Many of them sealed their mission with their blood of martyrdom. After several times, the Church could be planted in many parts of the world and was deep rooted in the soil of martyrdom.



In the beginning of the fourth century, the Church had planted in the Roman Empire. It does not mean that the mission spirit of the Church ends. The Holy Spirit keep urging the Church to bring the Good News to other part of the world, where Jesus is not known. Great missionaries continuously emerge like: St. Patrick



in Ireland, St. Boniface in Germany, and Saints Cyril and Methodius among the Slavs. For many centuries, monasteries became centres of the Church's evangelization, culture, and charity. The face of human world cannot be separated from the role of the Church's mission.

God sent the Church to the "Newly Discovered World". The discovery of the new world is a new Pentecost for the Church. With tremendous zeal, the Church responded the mission from the Lord. Many great missionaries appeared: St. Francis Xavier

in Asia, Fray Bartolomé de las Casas, Fray Junípero Serra, etc. Alongside these great missionaries, there are countless Franciscans, Dominicans, and Jesuits, brought the faith to millions of people throughout the world.

In the 19th century the Church witnessed the establishment of many new missionary congregations in the world, such as the White Fathers, the Missionary Sisters of the Holy Spirit, etc. Africa, Asia, and Oceania become the fertile ground of their missionary activities. During this period, missionary spirit does not find its expression in leaving the missionaries' land of origin only, but it discovers its form in the prayer. Without ever leaving her convent St. Thérèse of Lisieux becomes the patroness of the missions through her constant prayer. Missionary work is no longer just about going to foreign lands and to preach peoples, but it reaches to its new understanding that every baptized person is a missionary. St. John Paul II, in *Redemptoris Missio*, reminded us that mission *ad gentes* (*to the people*) remains a priority of the Church, but so does the reevangelization of de-Christianized cultures or societies.

The Needs of Missionary Spirit Today

The present Church do realise that today more than ever, the world needs missionaries. The true missionaries, nowadays, do not necessarily appear with sandals in remote jungles, but they can exist with willing hearts in homes, on social media, in offices and communities. Many people live in the era marked by relativism, secularism, and religious indifference. They have never heard and totally do not know Christ. At the same time, however, many baptized individuals have consciously abandoned their faith in Christ. For this reason, Pope Francis expresses it clearly: "I prefer a Church which is bruised, hurting and dirty because it has been out on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security." (Evangelii Gaudium, 49). The peripheries or frontier world are not only based on geographical borders. There are also existential and experiential peripheries: loneliness, despair, spiritual poverty, addiction, and meaninglessness. The Christians are called to these as well.



How to live up Missionary Spirit in our daily life

Missionary works begin with loving those closest to us, namely, our family. The first mission field is our own

family: teaching the faith to our children, living the sacraments, creating a Christian atmosphere in the home, etc. After this then the mission field lies at work, university, in the street, etc. What does our life say to them? Coherent testimony, kindness, and hope speak louder than words. Preaching Good News is not about imposing idea to others but proposing meaning of life with joy. The new mission field which needs the Church response is digital continent. The present people, in general, are more easily touched by sharing reflections, respectful comments, Christian content.

Reviving the mission spirit in our life cannot ever underestimate the power of prayer. One of the best ways to support those on the front lines of mission spirit is to pray the Rosary, offer Masses. St. Thérèse ever said: "I



want to be love in the heart of the Church." To nurture our mission spirit, we can join many parishes and movements, which have mission spirit in their characters. We can also support them with catechesis, popular missions, social outreach, or financial support. Open our heart and be generous to what if God is calling us to something more radical? To leave everything for Him. Yes! Many young people, however, can discover their missionary vocation also, in the silence of prayer, or in the cry of the poor. Do not be afraid to say "yes" when Christ call us to participate in His salvific works.



God still Calls

Mission spirit is not something from the past or only for a select few. The Mission spirit is the very heart of the Christian life. Today the world certainly needs witnesses who truthfully speak of God with the new language of love, consistency, and hope in the present world. Christ still says: "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few. Pray therefore to the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into His harvest." (Luke 10:2).

NOVEMBER MONTH: PRAYING FOR THE DEPARTED SOULS IN PURGATORY

November is the month traditionally dedicated to remembering and praying for the souls of the faithful departed. It invites us to reflect on a profound and comforting truth of our Catholic faith — the teaching on Purgatory, which reveals the mercy of God in action. Without Purgatory, there would be only two possible destinations after death: heaven or hell. And since we must be perfect to



stand in the presence of God, what hope would we have? Thankfully, in His infinite love and mercy, God grants us the grace of purification through Purgatory — a path that leads ultimately to the joy of eternal union with Him.

All Souls' Day, also known as the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, is a special day of prayer and remembrance for our loved ones who have passed away. Prayers for all departed family members will be offered during all three Masses on 1 & 2 November as listed below.

BEFORE MASS

- Parishioners will bring the picture of their departed loved ones to the All-Souls Day Mass. The pictures will not be placed in front of the Altar but just held throughout the Mass.
- The Mass Intentions, especially for the dead will be placed in a black box before Mass. *The black box will remain during the entire month of November.*
- The Mass Intentions which are sent through the Google Form will be displayed on the screen 15 minutes before the Mass. We will also print these and place them inside the box.

DURING MASS

- Incense is used during the Mass.
- The Gloria & Creed will not be said during the All-Souls Day Mass, following the directives of the Liturgical Committee from KAJ.
- This black box will be carried at the beginning of General Intercessions, accompanied by 2 candles brought by Altar Servers. The box will be placed in front of the Altar and will remain there until the end of the Mass (choir plays instrumentally).
- At the end of General Intercessions, the celebrant stretches out his hands, ask the parishioners to hold the photos of their loved ones and say a special prayer for them.
- The celebrant will ask the parishioners to raise the photos and will sprinkle the photos with holy water (choir sings an appropriate hymn). The Mass continues with Offertory

Jesus promised St. Gertrude that a thousand souls would be released from purgatory each time the following prayer is said devoutly: "Eternal Father, I offer You the Most Precious Blood of Your Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the Holy Souls in Purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen."

Reflection #1 - - Celia (grade 7, Jakarta Taipei School)








Marriage – A Lifelong Commitment Blessed by God

The Family Apostolic Ministry (FAM) of our parish has been instrumental in conducting the Marriage Preparation Course (MPC) for couples preparing to enter the sacred covenant of marriage within the Catholic faith.

Through this program, FAM helps couples understand the true value of marriage and guides them in preparing to receive this holy sacrament — a lifelong commitment of love and faithfulness, blessed by God. Marriage is not merely a bond between two individuals, but a sacred union between two families and the Almighty.

Over the years, we have sought feedback from participants to gain deeper insights into their thoughts and inspirations — what motivates them to get married and what strengthens their resolve to live out this sacred commitment.



"Why do I want to get married?"

While there is no single "right" answer, their heartfelt reflections offer beautiful glimpses into how they view love, faith, and lifelong partnership. Here, we share a few of their reflections for our own inspiration

and reflection.

"I get married, because I want to give love, to receive love and to help my partner in the moments of need and to spend the rest of my life with the person I love. Furthermore, I want to fulfil God's will."

"Because I found someone through my prayers after all this time. Someone I love and who loves me unconditionally and being in this relationship with him doesn't make me lose myself at all. It feels like I found someone who always support me, now and then, good, and bad. This feeling makes me want to build a family with him."

"I do get married not because I want to but because I am ready to build a family in Christ with my partner in marriage. So, we can make other people to see Jesus through our family."



"I want to get married for companionship and to have a lifetime partner that I can share basically everything with."

"To be each other's home. I want to feel safe, seen, and loved no matter where I am in the world, knowing there is always someone in my corner and vice versa, I hope to make someone feel that way too".

"I get married to create a future and a family with the person I love the most — to grow together, dream together, and build something meaningful that is ours."

"I choose marriage so that we can walk through every season of life side by side — to celebrate the highs,

survive the lows, and face every challenge as a team. Not because life will be perfect, but because we will face it all together"

"Listening to Fr Moko's class on Building a Family Spirituality, it nails down into a lifetime commitment to love, support, care, develop your spouse for your spouse becomes a better person from time to time. It becomes so beautiful when the husband and wife implement this commitment to each other."

During the Marriage Preparation Course, we also invite couples to reflect on other important aspects of married life

— such as family, children, and prayer. From time to time, we will share their thoughts and insights here, to help our parish community better appreciate the beauty and depth of the Sacrament of Marriage.

Let us continue to pray for all married couples — that they may remain faithful to their commitment, and always grow closer to God and His Church.

YIPPIE! THE CHURCH HAS NEW SAINTS!

IT'S OFFICIAL! THE 7 NEW SAINTS OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH!

On October 19, Pope Leo XIV has canonized seven new saints: Bartolo Longo, Maria Troncatti, Vincenza Maria Poloni, José Gregorio Hernández, Mother María Carmen Rendiles, Ignatius Choukrallah Maloyan, Peter To Rot





St. Bartolo Longo: Born into a Catholic family in Italy, Bartolo lost his way when his mother died, and eventually descended into satanism. A Catholic priest reintroduced him to the sacraments, prompting his reversion to Catholicism. He became a Third Order Dominican, but still suffered guilt over his former sinful lifestyle. He found his lifeline by praying the Rosary and dedicated his life to promoting it.

St. José Gregorio Hernández: Saint José Gregorio Hernández was a Venezuelan physician, scientist, and devout Catholic. He was known as the "Doctor of the Poor" for providing free medical care and charitable acts. He died in 1919 after being run over by a car while going to get medicine for a sick, elderly woman

St. Ignatius Choukrallah Maloyan: An Armenian Catholic archbishop of Mardin, Saint Ignatius Choukrallah Maloyan was known for his pastoral heart and his commitment to the poor. When the Ottomans entered WWI in 1915, they persecuted Armenian Christians in their territory, eventually resulting in genocide. They arrested Archbishop Maloyan along with hundreds of other Christians. His captors offered him his freedom in exchange for converting to Islam. He refused and died a martyr. He said: "If Jesus Christ, my Lord and my God, was crucified for me, why should I not be ready to die for Him?"

St. María Carmen Rendiles: Saint María Carmen Rendiles, a Venezuelan religious sister, founded the Servants of Jesus, she dedicated her life to serving the poor and Church. She was born without her right arm. Embracing this humbly, she did not let it interfere with serving others. She was known for her deep sense of peace, her trust in God, and promoting devotion to the Eucharist.

St. Maria Troncatti: Saint Maria Troncatti, an Italian Salesian missionary nurse, served the Shuar indigenous people in the Amazon rainforest of Ecuador. She worked as a nurse, surgeon, dentist, and catechist. She established missions, promoted the dignity of women, and fostered Christian families. In 1969, she died tragically in a plane

crash. She said: "A glance at the crucifix gives me the strength and the courage to work."

St. Peter To Rot: Peter To Rot was lay catechist who was martyred in 1945 for promoting the faith, despite a ban imposed by the Japanese. He firmly defended marriage and the family, in the face of widespread polygamy. He ministered to the faithful in secret. He will be the first native Papuan saint.

St. Vincenza Maria Poloni: As a young girl, Vincenza Maria Poloni devoted herself tirelessly to caring the elderly and sick. She founded the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy of Verona. She often said: "The poor are our masters, let us love them and serve them as we would serve Jesus Christ Himself."

It was Christmas Day. Beautiful sunny day, and the sun was glistering on the white snow in the garden. World was calm and slow. Inside the house, the usual noisy crowd, our grandchildren were turning the house upside down.

My wife and I were slowly preparing for the Christmas celebration. Gradually we cooled the kids down and all of us were standing in circle: (at that time) four grandchildren, our three kids with spouses, my daddy, my wife, and me. Four generations. As we were holding hands, we prayed the

Lord's Prayer. An old habit inherited from my wife's family is cutting an apple to as many pieces as we are on Christmas day, symbolizing the wholeness and unitedness of the family. After we pray the Our Father, my wife distributes the slices of apple, and we eat it as we chatter along.

Only this time, my daughter in law, Klaudia, wife of my son, already mother of two boys, she just waved to draw attention and broke her apple slice into two, saying: one more person is among us in this circle... This is how they announced that they were blessed with the third child. Two weeks later, we have learnt that Klaudia is expecting twins. Oh, Lord Jesus, how beautiful is this.

But, the pregnancy didn't develop as it should. An infection occurred and the babies were born prematurely in 24th week of pregnancy. The infection of the mother endangered her life, even the babies were in danger. The first act of God was that the delivery started, and babies were born alive. Very very small, 620 and 650 grams, but alive.


Our faith in God never wavered, and we reached out to everyone who could join us in prayer for our premature grandchildren. For many days, we prayed together as a family and as a parish community, asking the Lord to heal and strengthen them. In His infinite mercy, our prayers were heard — today, our grandchildren are healthy and thriving.

We give all praise and glory to Almighty God, for it was His loving hand that made this miracle possible. We also extend our heartfelt thanks to all parishioners and well-wishers who prayed with us. Your prayers were truly powerful.




CCD Annual Parents' Meeting for First Holy Communion and Confirmation

Saturday, October 10, 2025

The CCD Ministry held its annual mandatory parents' meeting for those whose children are preparing to receive the First Holy Communion (FHC) and the Sacrament of Confirmation. The session was filled with meaningful guidance, valuable insights, and inspiring messages for parents as they accompany their children on their faith journey.





For Confirmation parents, **Fr. Moko** led an engaging session focusing on living a balanced Christian life without anxiety and depression. Drawing from the book *Feeling Good: The New Mood Therapy by Dr. David D. Burns*, he highlighted key principles of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) and shared practical ways to overcome negative thoughts through faith and positive thinking. The session resonated deeply with the parents, many of whom actively engaged in the discussion and raised thoughtful questions afterward.

Bro. Dolphy led an informative segment on the significance of choosing a saint's name and sponsor, essential elements of the Confirmation sacrament. He also reminded parents of their important role in nurturing the seed of faith in their

children — a seed that will continue to grow and guide them throughout life.

Bro. Donny from the Youth Fellowship (YF) encouraged parents to motivate their children to remain active in YF after Confirmation. He shared how participation in YF sessions helps the youth deepen their faith and navigate the challenges of modern life. He also invited parents to send their children to the upcoming

Annual Youth Retreat, an opportunity for spiritual renewal and fellowship.

Meanwhile, Fr. Agung conducted a session with the First Holy Communion parents, offering a comprehensive explanation of the Seven Sacraments and their spiritual importance in a Catholic's life. He engaged the parents interactively, testing their understanding and sparking lively discussion — including the interesting question of whether we can receive all seven sacraments or a maximum of six.



The meeting was enriching and well-received by all participants, helping parents strengthen their understanding of their faith and their role in guiding their children's spiritual growth.

EXTRAORDINARY MINISTRY OF THE HOLY COMMUNION(EMHC)

Annual Workshop for the Ministry of EMHC's

On October 4 and 11, 2025, our Parish held its annual workshop and spiritual formation for the Extraordinary Ministry of the Holy Communion (EMHC), welcoming both current and prospective ministers, along with guest participants from St. Theresia Parish, Blok Q Parish, and Curug, Tangerang. The workshop began with a session by Mrs. Maria Fransisca Dinar

Ari Wijayanti, Vice Chair of the Liturgical Committee of the Archdiocese of Jakarta, accompanied by Mr. Antonius Nugroho, and concluded with a solemn renewal and installation ceremony led by Father Agung Widjajanto, S.J., the Assistant Parish Priest, who officially inducted 23 new and continuing EMHC members.



In his presentation, "The Eucharist: "Jesus Christ's Sacrifice, His Divine Presence, and our Spiritual Nourishment," Fr. Moko, S.J., Parish Priest, emphasized that the Eucharist is the Source & Summit & the heart of our faith — a sacred mystery where heaven touches earth. In it, Christ's sacrifice of love is made present again, renewing the covenant of mercy and redemption. As spiritual food, the Eucharist nourishes our souls, strengthens faith, and fills us with grace to love, forgive, and serve.

The Workshops covered in depth of our spirituality, that is our personal relationship with God, the most Holy Trinity: God the Father,

God the Son (Jesus Christ) and God the Holy Spirit. And that our relationship to God the Father can intimately be revealed in the celebration of every holy Mass: of which from every Eucharistic prayer to Eucharist, is one complete offering of Jesus to God the Father: as shown in the doxology "Through Him, with Him, and in Him..." which concludes the prayer by offering Christ's sacrifice to God the Father. This moment encapsulates the entire offering of the Mass — everything presented to the Father, through Jesus, in unity with the Holy Spirit — the Church's great act of thanksgiving before all respond with a heartfelt Amen.

The workshop further reflected on the calls to leading holy life, the strength from fervent prayers and the need to serve with humility, following Christ who came not to be served but to serve. The importance of the Sacrament of Reconciliation was underscored,



highlighting the merits of frequent confession as a means of restoring grace, strengthening the soul against temptation, and renewing one's readiness to receive the Eucharist worthily. Through this, participants were reminded of God the Father's constant nearness — for every Mass is a prayer offered to Him, and in each Our Father, we rediscover His unconditional love and divine mercy.



We pray that our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion be continually strengthened by God's grace, inspired by the love of Christ, and remain steadfast in their call to serve with holiness and humility.
