



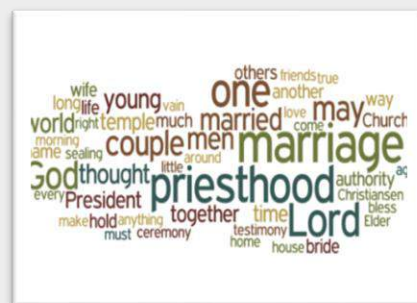

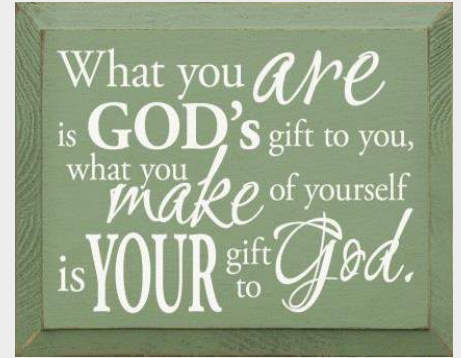
a). Giving should come from the heart. The grateful heart leads me to share with others the blessings I receive. The more I give from the heart the more I receive the generosity of others.

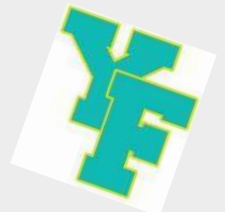

Purity of heart: means purity of intention -> trying to fulfil God's will

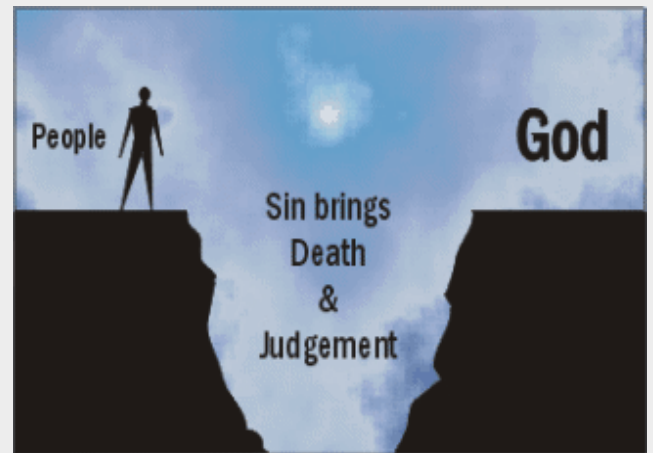
purity of vision -> looking at others with God's eye (not looking at their shortcomings)

Discipline of feelings and imagination (avoiding and combatting impure thoughts)

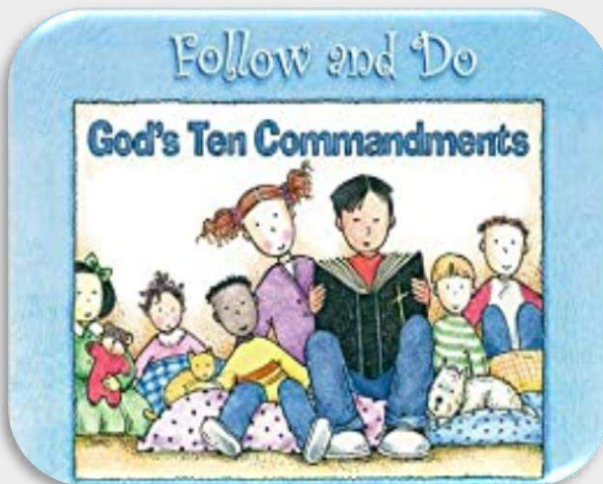
Living in prayerful life

Reflection #3- By Jeremy Isman, Junior at Notre Dame University

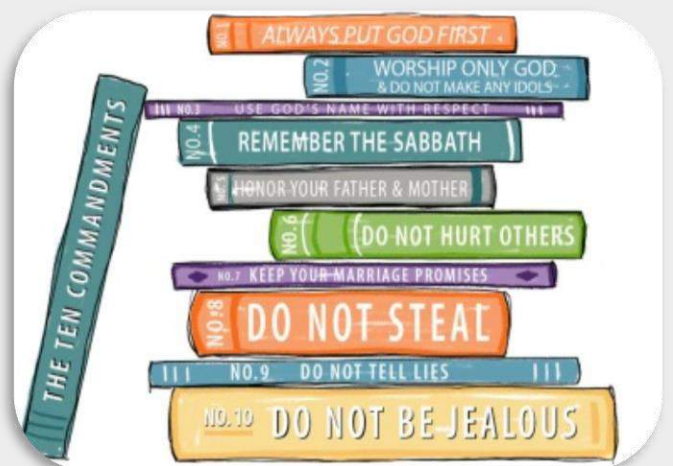

FAITH FORUM

13th Faith Forum

Topic: "The Book of Psalms – Praying through the Scriptures"

Fr. James stated the faith forum by referring the Psalm

121 – "Our help is from Yahweh" and how our Almighty Lord can guard and protect us. Psalm is a sacred song or poem used in worship especially: one of the biblical hymns collected in the Book of Psalms.

The Psalms give us the means to come to prayer in a fresh state of mind, they enable us to see that we're not the first to feel God is silent when we pray, nor are we the first to feel immense anguish and bewilderment while praying. The Psalms offer us ways to rejoice in prayer, to bow in worship, to exalt God for all he does and for all his blessings to us.



But there are plenty of other reasons to use the Psalms. Without their assistance, it's easy to get into a routine of prayer, feeling as though you're saying the same things over and over. And feeling, often, that God doesn't hear you.

In its present form, the book of Psalms consists of 150 poems divided into five books (1–41, 42–72, 73–89, 90–106, 107–150), the first four of which are marked off by concluding doxologies. Psalm 150 serves as a doxology for the entire collection.

Psalms are written for different situations and Fr. James explained on how Psalms can be used for different situations like the below:

- When you are afraid and when you are battling loneliness...
- When you are fighting depression and when you feel impatient...
- When you feel weary and when you're dealing with enemies...
- When you are enduring a trial and when you have financial trouble...
- When you need vindication or justice & when you need wisdom...

We will upload on our website the details list of Psalms for the above situations, and you can download and use as ready reckoner. We hope this list will be an encouragement to you. No matter what you're facing, the Word of God is the answer. If you begin in the Psalms, don't let that be the end of your study. Fill your heart and mind with the Word, and you will build unstoppable faith and triumph in any situation!

There's nothing quite like a Psalm to still your mind in the wee hours of the morning, when sleep refuses to come; or to have those familiar lines come to mind when life appears to have gone askew. Psalms are life line to our daily living, use it in your daily prayers.



There are times our youth have many questions and they do not know how to get the right answers, here in this section all these questions related to our faith are being answered by our Parish Priest – Fr. Moko:

Q. Why is sincerely attending the mass is not enough?

The Eucharist is the summit and the source of Christian life. The Eucharist is not only a way to receive grace, but it is Jesus himself, who is the source of all Graces, and the goal (summit) of our lives.

Pope Benedict XVI says: "We cannot approach the Eucharist without being drawn into the Mission". The Eucharist then is sharing, solidarity, and responsibility for the larger society, the poorer people.

The Eucharist overflows into life in the form of generosity, kindness, forgiveness, sincerity, and persevering work. Our lives are the continuation of our Mass.

Why does the Catholic Church have no female priests?

Before we can answer this question, we should understand first that the female or male ordination topic in the Catholic Church is not about the equality or gender issue or about superiority or inferiority between male and female.



The teaching of the Church is biblical and historical. Catholics have always insisted that the ordained ministry has its origin in Jesus' own choice of the Twelve [Apostles] and that they are the foundation of the Church. Following Jesus' example of choosing 12 males to be His apostles, the Church from the earliest days has reserved the priesthood to males.

History shows that the first Christians believed that Christ intended a male- only priesthood. The authority of the Church has been "absolutely consistent" on the issue, even

when it was challenged by Protestant Reformation. It is part of the deposit of faith that is never questioned.

The Protestant churches effectively abandoned the idea of the priesthood in favour of "a pastoral ministry" in which men and women could participate.

Nevertheless, the Catholic Church and the various Eastern Catholic churches have held true to Christ's original plan.

Why do we use old songs and not newer ones?

True art is timeless. There is nothing old or new about it. There is a famous saying: the beauty is in the beholder. It means that people have different capacity to appreciate beauty. The more they know about one particular art, the more they can enjoy its beauty. For example, it would be different for a violin player who listens to a particular piece of music compared to those who doesn't understand the difficulty and complexity of playing a violin. So, for those who truly understand music, there is no such a thing as old or new. That's why the name its classical music not old music.

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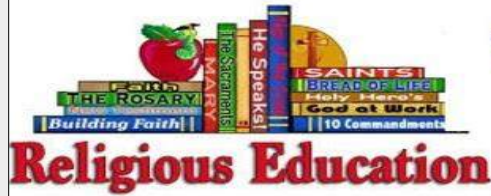

Dear children and parents,

Dear CCD Families,

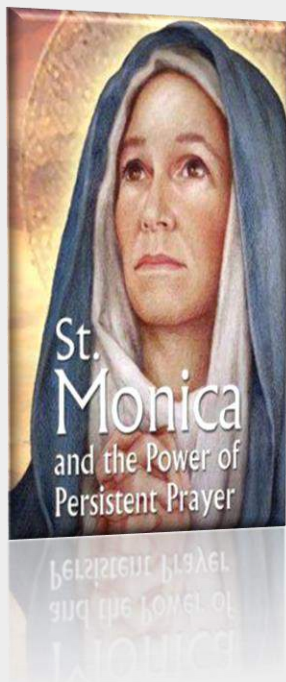
ONLINE COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES IN AUGUST 2021
